This dates from one of Holland's first trips to Paris in the early 1830s. The Eglise Saint-Séverin, on the street of the same name, is one of the oldest churches on the Left Bank. Originally dating from the thirteenth century, it was rebuilt after a fire in 1520. A related drawing dated 1831 was with Libson and Yarker in 2020 and another view of the church by Holland is in the Lady Lever Art Gallery, Liverpool (see Stephen Duffy, *The Discovery of Paris*, 2013, pp.84-5, no.35, ill.).
